The CCRAS is also planning a survey of Ayurvedic practitioners in India that will cover many of the same topics as in this U.S. survey, and likely will even use some of the same questions. This will help us identify high priority projects for future collaboration between India and the U.S.

One of the goals of our team is to encourage greater dialog and understanding between Western biomedical practitioners/researchers and practitioners/researchers who work with Ayurveda. This is in hopes of facilitating collaborative research, the results of which will provide the basis for evidence-based integrative practice.

This survey research study is a critical step in that direction. Information gathered from this study will be reported in medical journal articles which will undoubtably increase the awareness in the biomedical community of Ayurvedic practice.
